

Daniel in the Lions' Den - Dan. 6

- One of the most familiar events in the Old Testament
- Focus is on one day in Daniel's life
- Same amount of Scripture as Daniel chapter 7
- Daniel 7 is the panoramic view of world history
- The lions' den was very significant to God
- Why did the lions' den mean so much to God?

The darkest hour is just before dawn

- Daniel's enemies set a trap to kill him
- Daniel obeyed God rather than men
- Same as John & Peter in Acts 4:19-31, 5:29
- The king had no choice; he sent Daniel to the lions
- The king ran back at dawn, hoping Daniel survived
- Daniel is alive: Dan.6:21; Isaac: Gen.22:10-12; Joseph: Gen.45:28; Jesus is alive: John 20:14-16

Not of the world – John 17:16

- Why should we care about Daniel's story?
- The early church was still being fed to the lions
- Believers today are being thrown the "lions"
- We are out of step with the world
- Daniel's 3 friends stood while everyone else bowed;
 Daniel kneeled while others stood. Dan.3, 6
- We live every day in a lions' den we call the world
- Satan wants to devour our soul. 1 Pet.5:8

The Resurrection of God's Son

- The king thought Daniel would die; Abraham thought Isaac would die; Jesus really died
- Compare King Darius coming at dawn, and his joyous reunion with Daniel, to Matt.28:1-9
- The lions' den is important to God because it foreshadows the resurrection of His Son
- The king destroyed Daniel's enemies, then proclaimed Daniel's God throughout the kingdom
- The return of Christ will destroy God's enemies

The Return of God's Son

- The lions' den is also important to God because it foreshadows the return of His Son
- The lions' den pictures Christ's resurrection & return
- Easter vs. Armageddon, salvation vs. condemnation
- What makes the difference between these outcomes?
- Each person must choose to call on Christ. Heb.11:6
- There is no other way to be saved
 Rom.10:13 = Acts 2:21 = Joel 2:32

With power and great glory - Matt.24:30

- 1st Coming of Jesus: the suffering servant of Isa.53
- 2nd Coming: He will return to earth in power & great glory as King. Mt.24:30; Rev.19:16; Zec.14:4-5
- The last time the world saw Jesus, His body was being carried from the cross to the tomb. John 14:19
- The next time they see Him, He will appear in power & glory to judge. Phil.2:8-11; Rev.1:7

The Breath of God

- God spoke the universe into existence. Gen.1:3
- God breathed life into Adam. Gen.2:7
- Jesus breathed the Holy Spirit on others. John 20:22
- All Scripture is God-breathed. 2 Tim.3:16
- In Dan.2:31-35, the rock is the returning Christ
- Antichrist will be the most powerful king in history
- Christ will destroy Antichrist with a puff. 2 Thes.2:8



Why do the nations Psa.2:1-2 = Acts 4:25-26

Why do the nations so furiously rage together, and why do the people imagine a vain thing?

The kings of the earth rise up, and the rulers take counsel together against the Lord, and against His Anointed.

Let us break their bonds - Psalm 2:3

Let us break their bonds asunder, and cast away their yokes from us.



He that dwelleth in heaven - Psalm 2:4

He that dwelleth in heaven shall laugh them to scorn; the Lord shall have them in derision.

Thou shalt break them - Psalm 2:9

Thou shalt break them with a rod of iron; Thou shalt dash them in pieces like a potter's vessel.

Amidst the blaze of noon

- Handel was partially paralyzed by a stroke in 1737
- During the last 7 years of his life, he was blind
- · Soon after his eyes failed, Samson was performed
- The once-mighty organist had to give up his keyboard
- The tenor sang Handel's text: "Total eclipse no sun, no moon; All dark, amidst the blaze of noon"
- The irony of a blind Samson, and a blind composer no longer able to perform, moved the audience to tears


One of the first

- Handel was internationally famous in his own lifetime
- His music dominated Britain 150 years after his death
- "Handel was the master of us all." Franz J. Haydn
- "Handel was the greatest composer that ever lived." -Ludwig van Beethoven
- Handel was one of the first composers to have:
 - a biography written of him (1760)
 - centennial celebrations of his birth (1784-1786)
 - a complete edition of his music published (1787-97)

Following Handel's Footsteps

- Handel's legacy includes:
 - Joy to the World (words by Isaac Watts)
 - Thine is the Glory (Risen, conq'ring Son)
 - English Oratorio → hymns & choir anthems
- Handel inspired great composers:
 - Beethoven: 'Joyful, Joyful We Adore Thee'
 - Beethoven's 'Hallelujah' (from Mount of Olives)
 - Haydn: Creation ('The Heavens are Telling')
 - Mendelssohn: 'Hark! The Herald Angels Sing'

From Handel to Beethoven

- Handel's life work was published in 40 volumes
- Beethoven cherished his set; he copied it by hand
- Beethoven greatly admired Handel's work
- Handel's Messiah permeated Beethoven's mind
- On his deathbed, Beethoven quoted from Messiah
- He said "If there is a physician that can help me now His name shall be called Wonderful"

We Shall See Him - 1 John 3:2; 1 Cor.13:12

- We know that we shall see the great Physician
- God is faithful. Psa.145:13; 1 Cor.1:9; 2 Cor.1:20
- How do we know we will go to heaven?
- Because of:
 - the **price** He paid 1 Thes.5:9-10
 - the promise He made John 14:1-6
 - and the **prayer** He prayed John 17:24
- We will see His glory in heaven

Our Messiah's Anthem


- Our citizenship is in heaven. Phil.3:20
- For all eternity, we will sing glory to God
- There is a Hebrew word meaning "Praise God!"
- It occurs only 4 times in the New Testament, all in the 1st 6 verses of Rev.19 when Messiah returns
- The word is Hallelujah

Hallelujah! For the Lord God omnipotent reigneth. The kingdom of this world is become the kingdom of our Lord, and of His Christ; and He shall reign forever and ever. King of Kings, and Lord of Lords. Hallelujah!

Many convincing proofs – Acts 1:3

- If the resurrection didn't happen:
 - our faith is futile;
 - those who have fallen asleep in Christ are lost;
 - you are still in your sins. 1 Cor.15:12-19
- But we have eyewitness testimony
- Our risen Lord appeared to many people during the 40 days between the first Easter and His ascension
- 500+ people saw Him at the same time. 1 Cor.15:3-8

Evidence for the Resurrection

- The changed lives of the apostles
- They came out of hiding as courageous leaders
- They risked their lives to preach His resurrection
- Dramatic conversions and transformations of James, Paul, many Jerusalem priests. Acts 6:7
- Thousands were convinced that Christ was risen
- The early church grew explosively. Acts 2:41, 4:4

Knowledge of the truth – 1 Tim.2:4; 2 Tim.2:25

- Christianity became a religion separate from Judaism
- Christians stopped worship on the Saturday Sabbath
- They met on Sunday to celebrate the resurrection
- Carefully examining the Gospels led many to faith:
 - Simon Greenleaf (wrote the textbook on evidence)
 - C.S. Lewis (author)
 - William Ramsay (Oxford scholar, archaeologist)
 - Josh McDowell (author: apologetics, youth ministry)
 - Lee Strobel (journalist)


Women told the apostles - Luke 24:10

- Women comforted Jesus, confronted Peter, and warned Pilate. Matt.26:6-10, 69-72, 27:19
- Women observed His burial. Matt.26:56b, 27:61
- Women were the last to leave the cross, and first to arrive at the empty tomb. Mark 15:40-41, 16:1-4
- 1st witnesses: Women couldn't testify in Jewish court
- If resurrection was fiction, why women in lead roles?
- These details would not appear unless they were true

The Empty Tomb and the Missing Body

- Jewish historians admit that the tomb was empty
- In Jerusalem, preaching the resurrection would be foolish unless everyone knew the tomb was empty
- Temple authorities couldn't counteract the apostles' preaching; they couldn't find the body of Jesus
- They would have paid a fortune for information
- Instead they were so desperate to silence Christians that they had to resort to persecution

Natural explanations for the resurrection

- Paul & early Christians were absolutely convinced of the resurrection. 1 Cor.15:3-4, 14-19; 1 Thes.4:14
- All the proposed "natural explanations" for the empty tomb are unconvincing, weak and improbable
- These alternative theories all require at least as much faith as believing the resurrection itself
- After trying for 2000 years, here are the top 6 alternatives proposed by critics

- Stolen body oldest & simplest theory. Obstacles:
- Robbery of a guarded tomb (Matt.27:62-66) required strong incentive & courage. Who had these traits?
- Not the disciples; they were dejected and fearful
- Not Pilate; he was glad his problem was solved
- Not the Jewish leaders; they desperately wanted to prove the corpse was undisturbed on the 3rd day
- If the authorities had the body, why would they accuse the disciples of stealing it? Matt.28:11-15

- Wrong tomb; the women were in the wrong location
- The burial had been hasty; it was hard to see at dawn
- A gardener tried to help, but they ran away in fear
- Obstacles: The 2 Mary's directly observed the burial and size of the stone. Matt.27:61
- Joseph, John, Peter, the Jewish authorities or the guards would have corrected the women within hours

- "Lettuce"; the gardener was upset about curiosity seekers trampling his lettuce patch near the tomb
- So he moved the body to disperse the crowd
- This was one of the earliest non-Christian theories
- Obstacles: Roman soldiers and Joseph (owner of the tomb) would have prevented this.
- How would the gardener roll away the stone, and leave the grave cloth undisturbed?

- "Swoon"; Jesus didn't die, he just fainted
- Later in the tomb, He revived, pushed the stone and tiptoed past the guards. Also proposed in 2nd century
- Disciples helped Him recover, but He had a relapse
- He gathered the disciples on the Mount of Olives.
 He walked off into the fog, then died in the woods
- Obstacles: it goes against all the evidence
- Crucifixion victims did not escape with their lives

- Hallucination the appearances were mass hysteria
- It was contagious; soon others could see it too
- It was a delusion to help believers in their grief
- Also recorded in the 2nd century. Obstacles:
- 500+ people saw Him at the same time. 1 Cor.15:6
- Inconsistent with symptoms of mass hallucinations
- Why did the visions stop after 40 days (Acts 1:3)?
- Doesn't explain the empty tomb

- Jesus had a twin brother, very few people knew
- But after Jesus died, the disciples convinced him to pretend he was Jesus. Obstacles:
- No previous mention that this person exists
- Thomas saw crucifixion wounds (was the twin also wounded?)

They knew it was true

- Apostles boldly preached Christ at the Temple; they expected pain, jail, death. Acts 2:46, 3:1, 4:1, 5:12, 5:42
- Many are willing to die for what they believe is true
- But there's no reason to die for what you know is a lie
- The apostles were in a unique position to know for sure what actually happened on the first Easter
- They devoted their lives to Him; they knew it was true

The first-fruits of them that sleep

- For believers, death is like sleep. 1 Thes. 4:13-15;
 1 Cor.11:30, 15:6, 18-20, 51-54; John 11:11-15
- The grave is a temporary resting place
- Our word cemetery comes from a Greek word meaning "a place where strangers rest" Rev.14:13
- The early church used this same word for 2 different places: the church graveyard, and the hotel
- In hotels, people sleep for a while, and then leave

The God of Love - Eph.2:4-5, 1 John 3:1

- God saved us because of His great love. John 3:16
- · We were God's enemies; He sacrificed His Son for us
- God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us. Rom.5:6-21
- Christ is the firstfruits the first person who received a permanent resurrection body. 1 Cor.15:20
- Firstfruits implies there will a 2nd, 3rd, 4th, etc.
- Because He lives, you also shall live. John 14:19



I know that my Redeemer liveth Job 19:25-26, 1 Cor.15:20

I know that my Redeemer liveth, and that He shall stand at the latter day upon the earth; and though worms destroy this body yet in my flesh shall I see God. For now is Christ risen from the dead, the first-fruits of them that sleep


